'We'd Still Be Picking Up The Pieces'

o you remember what you were doing on July 23, 2012? If you don't, you're in good company. I have no recollection of what I was doing that day.

But if things had gone just a bit differently, we'd all remember where we were and what we were doing when the world was plunged back into the "Dark Ages."

Further, it's quite possible we'd still be trying to recover.

Let me explain.

And this is doubly-important because all too often I hear nitwits – my favorite term for people who go through life unprepared – claim that those of us who are self-reliant are just scaremongers who spread rumors of doom and gloom that could never really happen.

So better yet, let me explain by using the words of Brian Williams of NBC Nightly News. A member of the Mainstream Media if ever there was one. And yes, I know what you probably think about the Mainstream Media because I feel the same way.

But for what I'm about to tell you, I want you to hear it from a Mainstream Media source. That way, when you share it with friends who are not as prepared and self-reliant as you, they can't accuse you of pulling information from some obscure website or news source.

This week, in "Solar Flare Almost Sent Earth Back to the Dark Ages in 2012," Brian Williams told the NBC Nightly News audience:

"Based on what we know now, it's

worth wondering how life would have been different if a sun storm had not barely missed us back on July 23rd of 2012. It just aimed away from planet Earth at the last minute. It came very close to being the worst in a hundred and fifty years. ...

"According to NASA, physicists are just now realizing how close we came to getting clobbered by waves of solar energy – a mass ejection of clouds of the suns plasma – that would have crippled satellite communications and the power grid.

"That means blackouts, city water systems, transportation, health and medical facilities. Scientists say we'd still be picking up the pieces if it had hit us two years ago. They also say we face a 12 percent chance of it happening over the next decade."

It took Williams less than one minute to deliver that report. I bet very few people even saw the report.

And yet, think about how different life could be right now for all of us – most especially those who are unprepared to go without electricity for an extended period of time.

Did you pay attention to the last sentence in the report?

"[Scientists] also say we face a 12 percent chance of it happening over the next decade."

Now I don't know, but I assume if there's a 12 percent chance over the next decade, there's a 36 percent chance over the next 30 years.

That would mean a better than 1 in

3 chance that in the next 30 years the power grid of the United States could be crippled for a very long time. And that's just the odds from a solar flare. It doesn't include the risk from man-made problems.

If that's not a wake-up call for getting prepared to survive without power, I don't know what it will take for people to get prepared.

But I do know this.

The overwhelming majority of Americans will not be prepared.

The government will be almost useless in assisting those who are not prepared.

There will be civil unrest of unimaginable magnitude.

You will only survive if you are prepared to provide your own food, water, medical supplies, shelter, and self-defense.

It really is that simple.

"The surveillance files highlight a policy dilemma that has been aired only abstractly in public. There are discoveries of considerable intelli-

tercepted messages — and collateral harm to privacy on a scale that the Obama administration has not been willing to address."

OK. I don't want to throw too much at you today – after all, the <u>Self-Reliance Institute Members Area</u> should provide you with a bunch of new material to evaluate – but I did want to mention a new encrypted email service I've been testing.

I shared this with some other folks earlier this week, and some seemed to have a problem using it. So, in case you learned about it and are having problems, let me share with you what I shared with others and then explain a few items.

The service is called <u>Tutanota</u> and here's how they describe their free email encryption service:

"Take back your privacy! With our secure webmail service you can send encrypted emails very easily. The innovative solution allows you to reach everybody tap-proof. With the automated encryption it becomes



fun to send secure emails! Of course you can also send and receive non-encrypted messages."

Here's part of what the respected website <u>eSecurity Planet</u> had to say about Tutanota:

"The German encrypted email provider Tutao, which was launched in 2012 in response to Edward Snowden's revelations regarding NSA surveillance, last week announced the availability of its <u>Tutanota</u> <u>Free</u> email service. ...

"Company co-founder Arne Moehle said in a statement that the service promises total data privacy. 'All user data is encrypted locally on the user's device before being transmitted to our German-based servers,' he said. 'The data cannot be accessed by anybody. Not even we have access.'"

Now when I shared this with some other folks, I wrote:

"From what I've seen so far, Tutanota is the real deal. So, give it a try and let me know what you think!"

OK. A few important points that I should have added – and I will add now to make certain no one misun-derstands.

Tutanota is brand new and is therefore a Beta service that is not yet a fully developed email service. So, there are some restrictions and drawbacks in the way the service functions and, therefore, the service is not right for everyone.

For example, if you don't have a mobile phone, you can't register

with the service as that is how they send verification codes for password changes (a very common method these days).

As with any service or product, it's always important to read through the FAQ section (frequently asked questions) and see if the product/ service seems like a good fit for you.

<u>If it doesn't – don't use it</u>.

Here is the FAQ for Tutanota.

In general, I always caution folks who are not experienced with using and testing Beta programs and services to do so with hesitancy. That's what I do. If I don't completely understand the service or feel I can use it confidently, I'm happy to wait until others have blazed the trail a bit more before I get onboard.

I hope that makes sense! I never want folks to jump into a new program or service if they don't fully understand the program or service.

Having said that – if you give Tutanota a try, let me know whether it works for you and if you think it has promise as an encrypted email service. If it doesn't – No Worries! There are many similar programs being designed as we speak in response to the Snowden revelations.

I have great confidence that in the coming months we'll have many encrypted programs and services to review and try and we'll find ones we really, really like and are userfriendly.

This week, in <u>"Detroit police chief</u> <u>gives credit to armed citizens for</u> <u>drop in crime,"</u> The Detroit News reported:

"Fed up with crime, some armed Detroiters have developed itchy triggerfingers — and Police Chief James Craig said lawbreakers are getting the message.

"In the latest incident, police say an 88-year-old who was beaten and robbed inside his east side home last week probably thought he was defending himself against attackers when he opened fire Monday on a television news crew."

Now get this. Even though that 88-year-old man shot at a television news crew — not a criminal

trying to break in his home and attack him — Chief Craig (and his assistant chief!) defended him.

In my book, that's the kind of police chief we need in every community in this country.

According to the report, here's what Assistant Chief Steve Dolunt said about the incident.

"'I think he was traumatized; he got beat up pretty good,' Dolunt said. 'When the second reporter went onto his porch, he may have thought she was the woman who had tricked him, and he probably thought he was defending himself.'

"Dolunt said police are investigating the matter, and it will be up to prose-

cutors to decide whether to bring charges."

Let's hope the prosecutors have the good sense to leave this 88year-old man alone. After all, he was in his home.

So do incidents like this reduce crime? Do they deter criminals from breaking into homes and attacking innocent citizens?

Well, here's more from the report.

"The incident was the latest in a string of homeowners opening fire to defend themselves, although after a flurry of such shootings early this year, before Monday there hadn't been a reported incident since May 4 — an indication that

> d criminals are thinking twice about breaking into people's houses, Craig said.

"Detroit has experienced 37 percent fewer robberies in 2014 than during the same period last year, 22 percent fewer break-ins of businesses and homes, and 30 percent fewer carjackings. Craig attributed the drop to better police work and criminals being reluctant to prey on citizens who may be carrying guns.

"'Criminals are getting the message that good Detroiters are armed and will use that weapon,' said Craig, who has repeatedly said he believes armed citizens deter crime. 'I don't want to take away from the good work our investigators are doing, but I think part of the drop in crime, and robberies in particular, is because criminals are thinking



twice that citizens could be armed.'

"'I can't say what specific percentage is caused by this, but there's no question in my mind it has had an effect,' Craig said."

After quoting several ivory tower types who put forth the usual blather about guns being dangerous, the report checks in with a former criminal. You know, the type of guy with real world experience like the police chief.

"Detroit resident AI Woods, a selfdescribed former criminal who is now an anti-violence advocate and author, agreed criminals are thinking twice about attacking citizens.

"'If I was out there now robbing people these days, knowing there are a lot more people with guns, I know I'd have to rethink my game plan,' said Woods, 60."

Finally, let's hear some more truth from the chief!

"Craig said he doesn't believe gun ownership deters criminals from attacking other criminals. 'They automatically assume another criminal is carrying,' he said. 'I'm talking about criminals who are thinking of robbing a citizen; they're less likely to do so if they
